My work with the Schmucker-Smoker-Smucker database sometimes feels like an exciting commitment that could swallow the rest of my life. And sometimes I think I could enjoy that. Ecclesiastes 12:12b (Today's New International Version) says "Of making many books there is no end, and much study wears the body." The same kind of thing can be said about collecting genealogy information and working with it. There is no end of data. There are always births, deaths, marriages and other changes. And sometimes I can become weary. But there can also be much excitement.

Arthur A. Smucker began the SSS database about 1993, with the goal of entering into the database all of the information that John R. Smucker had gathered in his searching over many decades. Of course, while Art started his work, John kept on searching. Our files have evidence of John's work during the summer of 2006, just prior to his September 1 death.

About 2004, John invited me to assist Art. Eventually, Art suggested that we change places, and now he helps me. We still have the original goal: enter all of the information John gathered. Today, the database includes 47,306 names, and we are still not close to being done.

In addition, I am also on the lookout for the new information—marriages, births, deaths, etc. And we would welcome others who would join our team in a variety of ways.

Our first goal: Complete entering information compiled by John. Are there one or two persons who would join our team? Persons who come closest to enjoying this pay attention to detail, and have access to a computer which can handle the database. There would be several advantages if the persons would be reasonably close to Goshen, but we are willing to consider other options.

Second, I also dream of having a group of persons, mostly across the United States and Canada, who would forward information about Christian's descendants. People continue to be born, marry, raise families and die. This may include persons you know or read about in newspapers. But this can also be a fascinating way to initiate contact with persons whose personal story may be very different from your own.

Third, I also dream of finding one or two persons who would coordinate the ongoing gathering of information. Probably no one would gather information exactly like John did it. But here would be a core group who pass information on to those working with the database.

And finally, because Mennonite Church USA Archives has revised their guidelines, the information gathered by John is no longer stored there. Currently it is at an interim location. Preferably we will find another place which can provide archival quality environment. Access by those working with the database is also a consideration.

The earliest dreams were that information could be gathered on all of immigrant Christian Schmucker's descendants. John eventually discovered that this is a monumental task, and eventually he focused on the descendants of Christian's grandson son, also named Christian. This Christian was John's great-great-great-grandfather, and my great-great-grandfather. But we have added information about other branches to the databases as we have been able to find it.

And the dream goes on.

Going to Switzerland? Don't Skip France!

Montbéliard, France was a stop for Christian Schmucker as he worked his way to Pennsylvania and is very much worth a visit if one travels to France or Switzerland. Montbéliard is easy to get to and is a straight shot from Basel, Switzerland, plus it's only about an hour away. Basel is one of the least expensive European destinations from the US and the Basel airport, despite its name, is located in France, and is known in France as the Basel-Mulhouse Euroairport.

Montbéliard is in the Doubs Valley, Franche-Comté region, and is not a common place for tourists which we found delightful. For the most part, no English is spoken here, so either brush up on your French, or don't plan on conversing with the locals (they will make an exception if you are a paying customer, though you should expect to be pleasantly corrected in your pronunciation).

One travels on a highway from Basel (or the airport) through Mulhouse, France in the Alsace region, where there is a nice State Automobile Collection Museum, and then through Belfort, a charming town where there is a huge stone statue, the Lion of Belfort, by Bartholdi, the creator of the Statue of Liberty. We were there on a Saturday, and they had a huge farmer's market selling everything from flats of flowers to Paris fashions to hot pretzels. Don't spend too long in either place, though, because Montbéliard is the next stop and it is a gem! And it's lively and cosmopolitan which was something I didn't expect. There is an enormous downtown which not only has plenty of parking on the perimeter of a walking concourse; there are flowers everywhere and lots of non-touristy activity. We were told you couldn't get a bad meal in Montbéliard, and so we walked into the first restaurant we saw and were bowled over by the great food and wine. There was only one waitress in the whole staff that spoke a modicum of English, but we managed just fine.

The Castle of the Dukes of Württemberg is known locally as the Château de Montbéliard, and it is definitely worth a trip to see. The schedule is odd, and the castle is divided into more than one section, so be clear on which you'd like to see to know which schedule to look at. There is a museum which is open until midnight one night a month; the castle itself; and also an out-building where the genealogical records are kept. We stayed at an old castle-like house, the Hôtel de France, which is on the outskirts of town near the castle and just walked there. The hotel was only 49.00 (\$65.00) a weekend night with no amenities to speak of, but it was just fine and our photos look like we stayed somewhere really special. If you stay there, say no to their breakfast which is way overpriced and wasn't very good.

Our final stop for this leg of the trip was 10 miles south in Valentigney where we saw the Museum of Pioneer Agriculture, or the more exotic sounding (and Google search friendly), Le Musée de la Paysannerie et des Vieux Métiers. It isn't much different than the pioneer museums here, I suppose, and once again, the hours are

odd, and once again, they don't speak any English, but you know what? We had a lot of fun there! The museum is only open M-F unless other arrangements are made ahead of time. I had contacted them a month before we left and made arrangements using Google translate, and in the ensuing emails back and forth, I could tell the man I was talking to was getting nervous about the language difference. He wrote back that he had secured an interpreter for the time we would be there, so then I started getting nervous that he was expecting something other than a middle aged American and her only-somewhat-interested husband, but it all worked out beautifully. In addition to the interpreter, her husband who acted as her driver, and the man who runs the museum, a couple of board members and their dogs were part of the package as well, so it was like a huge party. The man who runs the museum would wax poetically in French for a long time, and then the interpreter would simply say something very short such as, "the windows are wavy because they are original." Then we'd all laugh because he obviously had said something way longer than that!



Somewhere between Montbéliard and Valentigney there is a Peugeot auto museum and factory if you're looking for more to do, but we found a little town named Audincourt which was just a perfect little bustling town, and spent half a day there. There are a bunch of other things to do in the area, I suppose it depends on your interests, but a Google search of "Comte France" will bring them up in English. While there, be sure to try the local Comté cheese. One can imagine the Swiss bringing not only their cows, but their cheese making style to the area because it tastes an awful lot like a smooth Gruyère.

Car rental rates are cheapest in Germany, then France, and highest in Switzerland, (and higher still if you rent ahead of time from home) but no matter in which country you rent your car, you will save money by returning it in the same country. Eurocar in Lörrach, Germany is the closest bargain rental car place to the Basel airport, and can be easily and quickly reached by bus or train, but it takes time, so consider that France is cheaper than Switzerland for rental cars and exit the Basel airport on the French side if you are renting a car and can return it in France.

Should the SSS Family Association plan a trip to Switzerland?

Honoring Art Smucker

The SSS Family Association Board Members deemed it appropriate to honor Art Smucker with the title of SSS Family Archivist Emeritus for all his efforts in developing our SSS Family Database. The following is Art's biographical sketch to assist us in appreciating his background and efforts on our behalf.

Art Smucker Brief Resume

November 28, 2012

I was born on Nov. 27, 1923 in what was then British India of missionary parents, serving under the Mennonite Mission Board. I completed my schooling through HS Freshman level at Woodstock boarding

school in the foothills of the Himalaya Mts. We spent a year in the US when I was 5 during my parents' furlough, of which I have only few memories. It was at our mission station that my father baptized me at age 12. When I was 13 we returned to the US permanently, primarily because of my mother's poor health. On our way we traveled extensively through the Far and Middle East and Europe, eventually sailing from England for the US.

We spent our first year in Tiskilwa, IL, where most our relatives on both sides of the family were; and I took my sophomore year of HS there. We then moved to Goshen, IN I think in 1937 or perhaps 1938 where I finished HS. Since I was chronologically at least a year ahead of my classes, I then spent a year working, partly with a construction crew, and partly outdoor painting with my Dad and older brother, Ernest, my only sibling.

I then entered Goshen College, from where I was drafted as a Conscientious Objector toward the end of my sophomore year. I spent 3 years in CPS, the first several months at a forestry camp (Luray, VA) in Blue Ridge National Park, VA. The rest of my service was as an attendant in state mental hospitals in Howard, Rhode Island, Poughkeepsie, NY, and Norristown, Pa. During this time I volunteered to do relief work under MCC after the war, and took a number of classes to that end, including French.

In 1946 I traveled to Wissembourg, Alsace, France along with (eventually) around 18 other young men, to do transportation and reconstruction under MCC. I served as the local director of our group there under the supervision of Orlo Goering of Kansas for a year. Then I was transferred to Amsterdam, where I served as the first full time European representative of Menno Travel Service, at that time an arm of MCC. I arranged and conducted tours for students from Mennonite and affiliated colleges, and made travel arrangements for relief workers. While there, Oma Hershberger of Walnut Creek, Ohio, whom I had met in college, and become engaged to under a tree on the campus of Poughkeepsie State Hospital, N.Y., came to join me. We were married

in July of 1948, civil ceremony in Wissembourg, church ceremony by Harold S. Bender at the Childrens' Home in Mont-des-Oiseaux, near Wissembourg; and honeymooned in Switzerland.

We returned to the US in 1949 aboard the Queen Mary, and returned to Goshen, where I re-entered Goshen College. Our first child, Douglas, was also born that year. With extra credits I had picked up during CPS, I graduated from Goshen College in spring of 1950, and we immediately moved to Champaign/Urbana, IL., where I enrolled in graduate school at the U. of Illinois. I completed my Ph.D. work in summer of (I think) 1953, when we moved back to Goshen College, where I had signed a one year contract to teach Chemistry. I completed writing my Ph.D. thesis during that teaching year and received the degree that spring; and was then offered an extended contract to teach at Goshen College.

At one time or another I taught every chemistry course offered by Goshen, and also a number of General Education science courses; and served as head of the Div. of Nat. Sci. for a number of years. I taught for 31 years, and my last 4 years before retiring I was Director of Computing Services. During my teaching years, my wife and I led a year Summer Service Term units to Guadeloupe, French West Indies, during which we had three groups of students. Later we also led one term to Poland.

After I retired, I spent a year in Akron, PA in voluntary service doing computer work for Mennonite Disaster Service. I later served in many MDS units at major and minor disasters, as Project Director of Office Manager.

I have also traveled extensively in the US and abroad for business and pleasure, having been in 53 countries. I have been privileged to raft the Colorado River, spend a summer driving Alaska, visit the Galapagos Islands and take freighter cruises in the Mediterranean and Caribbean Seas. I have lived at least 3 months in 5 countries - USA, India, France, Netherlands and Poland; and at one time or another spoken at a conversational level 6 languages - Hindi, English, French, German, Netherlands Dutch and Polish.

My first wife and the mother of our 6 children (4 boys and 2 girls), died of cancer in 1994; and on Jan 1, 2001, I married Carol Schertz Oyer, widow of Prof. John Oyer of Goshen College, and a long time friend and acquaintance.

In December of 2010 I had successful open heart surgery at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN to repair the mitral valve. In Dec. of 2011 I was diagnosed and treated for advanced prostate cancer with substantial metastasis to my bones, again at Mayo Clinic. I am currently receiving hormone treatment (Luprone) which has temporarily arrested the cancer and allows me to live a pain free and fairly normal life. This is palliative, not curative, and will eventually cease to have an effect.

I was involved from the beginning (1973 ?) in the effort to enter the descendants of Christian Schmucker into a genealogical database. Originally the intent was to enter all his descendants and publish a book. We soon determined that was too much, and decided to focus on Christian III and his descendants, which work continues to this day. John R. Smucker was the primary data collector, though many others helped; and I did almost all the data entry, again helped from time to time, until several years ago, when Richard Miller "came aboard". He now takes primary responsibility for the paper records and the database, though I continue to help with checking and entering data from the records.

Jane also served as an historian for the North American Schmucker-Smoker-Smucker Family Association and wrote two books used as key resource documents by family association members. Jane taught genealogy in Downingtown and at West Chester Universities. A few of the estimated thirteen books she wrote or served as lead author included; "The Chester County Cookbook", "The History of Chester County", and "The History of Wallace Township, PA". Jane presented at many of the SSS Family Gathering and always brought forward new insights into our family history.

Jane is survived by her daughter, Christina K. Davidson of Glenside, PA and son Randy, husband of Sharon Davidson of Wagontown, PA, two grandchildren, Hunter and Blaise, and Jane's three siblings, Albert Smoker of Felton, PA, Claude Smoker and Marie Breneman, both of Willow Street, PA.

Funeral services were held on Thursday, December 20th, 2012 at the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Coatesville, PA followed by internment at the Oxford Cemetery.
